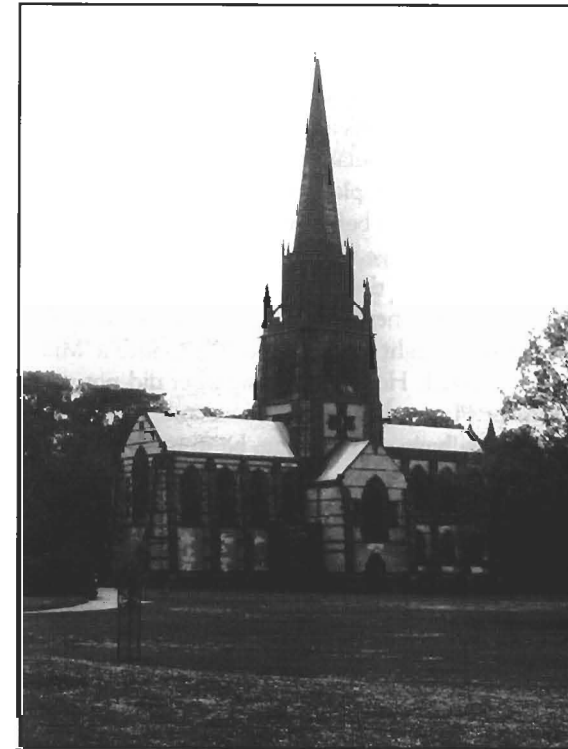

## WHO ARE THE CLUMBER PLAYERS? What are They?

Many moons ago, back in the spring of 1979 to be precise, a couple of local thespians, members of different groups, could be heard idly speculating on the chances of being involved in a Shakespearean production. They came to the conclusion that, although potentially the requisite number of actors could be found if various groups joined forces, there was no suitable venue available.

In the summer of the same year, two members of the then Worksoop Dramatic Society were talking with officials of the National Trust in Clumber Park in connection with a different project. The subject of the walled garden was raised and, though it was not suitable for the event under discussion, it suggested other possibilities - a Shakespearean production.

Members of three local groups came together for a meeting to discuss the matter, Lindrick players, Portland Players and Worksoop Dramatic Society (now Dukeries Theatre Group). The upshot of these discussions was the decision to stage the joint production of a Shakespeare play in the walled gardens, - the play selected? Twelfth Night.

A temporary stage was erected on pallets and the performances were received with enthusiasm. That should have been it, but the Players, always gluttons for punishment, decided that they wished to repeat the exercise, however they were not such gluttons for punishment that they wished to lug pallets around again.

The die was cast. The Players would, if they were permitted so to do, build a permanent stage and present productions annually. Lengthy discussions with Clumber Park ensued, with permission given and stipulations as to the materials to be used.

Throughout 1981 and 1982 the players laboured to raise money, dig footings, mix cement and to build the stage you see before you. In June 1982, exactly 1 week before the inaugural production upon it, the stage was completed. It was with considerable pride that the Players gave it into ownership of the National Trust.

That first production on the new stage was 'A Midsummer Nights Dream'. With a different group of individuals it might well have turned into a 'Midsummer Nightmare' - it rained - and rained and rained! However, the weather did not succeed in damping the enthusiasm of the Clumber Players or the audiences and early on in their existence the Players set a tradition. If they have an audience, be it an audience of only one, they will play, regardless of the elements are doing.

From those early beginnings - a one off production - the scope and reputation of the Clumber Players has grown. They are very aware of and humbled by, the loyalty of the audiences, many of whom travel considerable distances to share with them year after year. Without you, the audience, the Players' work would be futile and in the words of Feste in Twelfth Night, they will:-

*"Strive to please you everyday"*

## *Much Ado about Nothing*

*"Much Ado About Nothing" was probably written in the winter of 1598-99 and printed in 1600. Only two performances of the play within Shakespeare's lifetime are recorded, both at court in 1613 as part of the marriage festivities of Princess Elizabeth to the Elector of Palatine. At one of these the play was entitled, "Bendicke and Betteris", confirming for most people, these are the more memorable characters.*

*As usual, Shakespeare "stole" his starting plot by taking over a story that was already fairly well known and weaving together strands from different versions. The story of Hero and Claudio dates back to an ancient Greek romance and various sixteenth century poets had written on the theme; notably Matteo Bandello and Ludovico Ariosto. Shakespeare took some character names and the setting of Messina from Bandello, together with the main outline of the story, and adapted the plot and characteristics of these to fit his vision of the whole.*

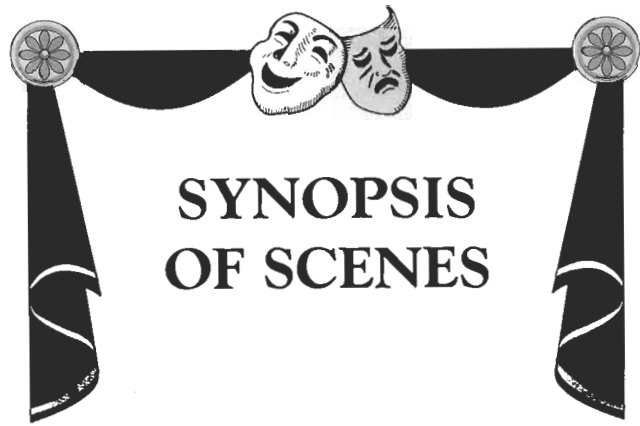
*The most vibrant characters of the play, however are Shakespeare's own invention; namely Beatrice, Benedick, Dogberry and Verges and it is these individuals who provide the most memorable incidents, the sparkle and "the human touch".*

*Don Pedro, Prince of Arragon, with Claudio and Benedick visit Leonato, Duke of Messina. Claudio falls in love with Hero, Leonato's beautiful daughter and arrangements are made for their marriage.*

*Beatrice, Leonato's lively orphaned niece, has for a long time waged a war of words with Benedick in a love/hate relationship. A plot is devised to make them fall in love.*

*Meanwhile, on a darker note, Don John, Don Pedro's malignant, bastard brother, is determined to wreck everyone's happiness and schemes to ruin Hero's reputation.*

Other hobbies include a general interest in all forms of classic/ vintage transport, computers and photography.



**Sexton - Jonathan Paulger**

A Clumber production without Jonathan just wouldn't be the same; this is his twentieth appearance for the Clumber Players. 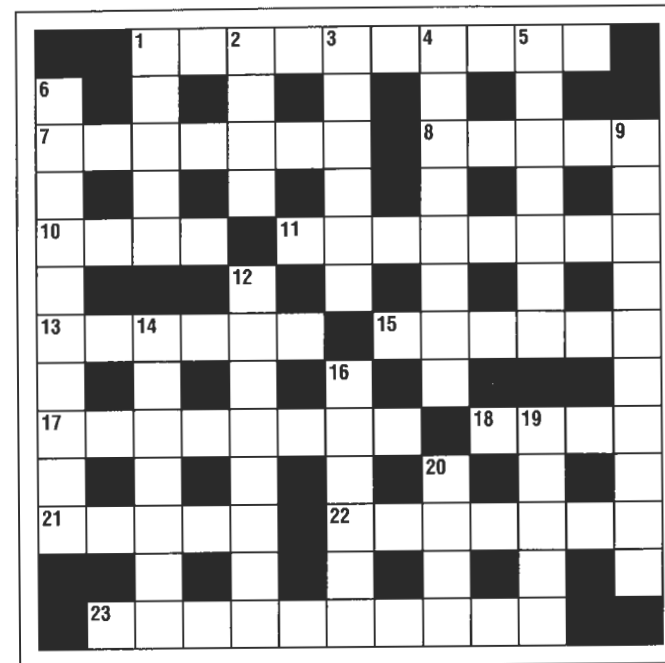
